EARTHQUAKE RELIEF THROUGH UMCOR

n Monday, Feb. 6, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake struck southern Turkey early in the morning hours. It was the most powerful earthquake recorded since 1939. Following the earthquake, at least 78 aftershocks were reported, followed by another earthquake of 7.5 magnitude. As of February 28th, more than 41,000 people have died as a result of the earthquakes.

The earthquake also heavily impacted northwest Syria where 4.1 million people depend on humanitarian assistance, the majority of which are women and children. Syrian communities are also facing an ongoing outbreak of cholera and winter weather events, such as heavy rain and snow. Due to the extreme weather conditions, the humanitarian re-

sponse is over-stretched.

UMCOR is the international mission, humanitarian relief and development organization of the United Methodist Church. It works with partners and churches in more than 115 countries to equip and transform people and places for God's mission including throughout the United States.

UMCOR and its partners are responding to the earthquake disaster daily. The organization has released initial solidarity grants to longstanding partner, International Blue Crescent and Forum for Development Culture and Dialogue (with Syria) to help provide tents, heaters, blankets, warm clothes, ready to eat meals and first aid kits to those who have

been displaced. IBC has offices in Turkey and multiple project sites.

How to give? Anyone wishing to offering monetary assistance to UMCOR in its earth-quake relief for the citizens of Turkey and Syria, simply write out a check payable to:

Many thanks to Nancy, also, for gifting the church with a subscription to the Lexington News!


Recently, members **Mable Hawkins** and **Janae Fuller** have been featured in the




