

#### The pessimist complains about the wind; the optimist expects it to change; the realist adjusts the sails. —William Arthur Ward

Very few people, if any, enjoy listening to someone complain. Some people complain about everyone and everything. Something is always going wrong — like the weather, traffic, high prices, the neighbors, the spouse, the children, the ingratitude of others, change, preachers, politicians, noise. These complainers are never satisfied. Life itself is a dreary burden.

Here's a story that gives us the chance to ask ourselves if we're wasting time by complaining.

A wise, old gentleman was a resident of an assisted-care facility. He had church people, family and friends who visited him regularly. Most of them spent the time complaining about the same old problems in life. Over and over again, the older man would hear the same complaints. On one occasion, it was too much to bear.

Jesus had some ideas about what made a person truly great. What he said to his disciples was so counterintuitive, so shocking, so unwelcome, that they had a hard time believing it.

What did the disciples believe about greatness? They thought, as did all their friends and family, that greatness was associated with power and authority. They believed that people who were great had but to utter a word and underlings would immediately obey. They knew that great personages had a large retinue of servants who waited on them for their every need.

The disciples had definite opinions about this, so much so, that they fell into an argument about it. Jesus noticed. "What were you arguing about on the way?" he asked.

They stood before him in utter silence "for on the way they had argued with one another who was the greatest."

Of course, Jesus knew. Then he dropped this life-altering bombshell: "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all" (v. 35).

Jesus' words are a game changer. The GOATS among us are the servants among us. Of all the life skills we need to learn, how to be a servant is the most important.



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

### Scripture Reading: James 2:1-10, (11-13), 14-17

If opportunity doesn't knock, build a door. —Milton Berle

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William Carey was highly educated and blessed with impressive linguistic skills. He was also a Christian, and while in India, he became passionate about making translations of the Bible in Bengali, Sanskrit and other languages and dialects. The tedium and stress of translation and the creation of dictionaries was enormous. The time required was unthinkable. Years, in fact.

And then something horrible happened. One spring day, whilst he was away from his station, a fire broke out, and all his work and that of his colleagues went up in flames. Everything Carey had accomplished including the manuscripts, grammars, dictionaries, buildings, printing presses and especially the Bibles — all in smoke and ashes. According to one source, "among the losses were many irreplaceable manuscripts, including much of Carey's translation of Sanskrit literature and a polyglot dictionary of Sanskrit and related languages, which would have been a seminal philological work had it been completed."

Can you imagine how Carey's staff must have dreaded Carey's return? They would need to explain how this had happened — how they had allowed this to happen!

Carey returned, and he was led to the site of the disaster. He knelt amid the smoking pile of rubble and thanked God that he still had strength enough to start over. Without a word of despair or anger, he immediately began to work.

Years later, he had not only replicated his earlier work, but he had also done a better job of it. His dictionaries, grammar books and translations of the Bible far surpassed the first effort.

This tragedy happened in 1812, more than 200 years ago. Thanks to William Carey's patience and perseverance, he brought the Bible to untold millions of the Indian subcontinent.

Have you ever faced crushing disappointment — the kind of setback that sucks the wind out of your lungs and causes your heart to flutter in despair? One such story is the tale of the ancient patriarch Job who suffered the loss of everything — his children, his friends and all of his material wealth. He even suffered the loss of his health, and he was in danger of losing his faith in God.

This is the danger of adversity: since we usually need someone or something to blame, we often turn our anger on God. Job did. But he recovered to assert that through it all he had learned that his Redeemer lived and that he was learning to trust in God.

Prayer: In my dark nights of the soul, let me still sense your presence. Amen.


