



◆ Present: Sarah Black, Teri James, Sharol McMullin, Roger McFadden, Liz Johnson, Rev. Andrew Sanders, Phillip Davis, David Cooley, Thomas Rowland, Jim Martin, Nancy Oles and Cheryl Cooley – by phone. Plus, Randy Hansen, guest (Lexington emergency management).

- ♦ Chairman Sarah called the meeting to order.
- Pastor Andrew opened with prayer.

Randy Hansen, Lexington emergency management was introduced to present information on how the church is used as an emergency space in the case of power outages in Lexington and/or other emergencies and his responsibility toward it. This began in 2011 with a generator set up at the church. In 2019 the generator was paid for fully by a grant. It was further upgraded recently to cover nearly the entire church from the Buddy Black Family Life Center up to the sanctuary but not including the sanctuary. We have cots, blankets and pillows stored on site. The health department and hospital also have additional bedding supplies.

◆ Spiritual Development | Pastor Andrew: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11 was read.

◆2025 Leadership Covenant: Council members not in attendance in February, read and signed the covenant.

◆Leadership | Pastor Andrew: Pastor announced that Donna and Scott Slusher have indicated they're ready to become members of the church. Two Sundays ago, the Bria and Lance Dobson family became members. Phillip suggested that when folks become members, that a member of the council - likely the chairman - stand with them and welcome them. He suggested presenting a plaque with the cross and flame on it, or certificate of some sort. Liz J reminded council that we have new member (and visitor) bags with goodies in them including a large sip cup with the church name on it and cross and flame that is given to new members. In addition, it was mentioned

that the new members, on the day they join, should stand in the reception line with the pastor at the end of the service so as to meet other congregants.

•February Minutes: Sharol moved to accept the February minutes with the addition of her name as present at that meeting, which was seconded by Phillip. So passed.

Finance Report: Phillip moved to accept the minutes, seconded by Jim Martin. So passed.

- ◆ Finance: Teri reported that we ended February with a tad over \$250 in the checking account. She indicated that the electric bill was very high and already is high for March.
- ◆Fundraisers | Lexington Trade Days | Sharol McMullin: Sharol explained that Kathryn Roberts, who volunteered to lead the Lexington Trade Days event set for the 4th Saturday of each month through November, will be in Florida for the month of April – therefore – the first Trade Days has been moved to the 4th Saturday in May. (5/24). Kathryn has already secured two food trucks – an ice cream truck and one with Mexican fare. Kathryn will work with Liz J in the office for accepting payments toward vendor spaces and advertising information.

♦ Fundraisers | Harvest Dinner | Sharol McMullin: Finance has chosen November 1st for hosting a Harvest Dinner in the Buddy Black Family Life Center from 6 to 9 p.m. It will include a free will donation, silent auction (possibly a live auction that may include an auctioneer), live entertainment throughout the evening including music and asking River City Players to perform a scene from their current play, and reaching out to the high school drama teacher for ideas. Cheryl Cooley and Teri James will provide the meat prep for the meal, but we will need church members to supply side dishes and desserts, plus volunteers to help during the evening. Committees will need to be formed. We will advertise in the newspaper, chamber and on social media. The event is to benefit church missions (apportionments).

◆Fundraisers | Homes Tour/Marcia Hicklin | Liz Johnson & Sharol McMullin: Quilter Marcia Hicklin has graciously offered to conduct tours in her historic home – not only inviting the community but also those in her reenactment community. We would need to provide at least 7 volunteers to be in the rooms in the house during the tours. Marcia will provide historic information. She suggested we provide baked goods for a bake sale to generate more income for the church. Liz J will reach out to Marcia to begin planning this – at least one to two tours for now – the first will be June 20th and 21st. Roger motioned to do the tours, seconded by Sharol. So passed.

- ◆ Quarterly Dinners | Teri James: We will have our first quarterly potluck meal following the June 8th service in the Buddy Black Family Life Center.
- ◆ Easter: Easter is April 20th. We will have four being confirmed on Easter Sunday. Pastor Andrew is currently holding confirmation classes. Sarah an Easter egg hunt. It was decided to have the egg hunt at 10 a.m. on Easter followed by cake and punch for the confirmands before the service. Liz J will get artificial flowers for the altar for Easter instead of live ones. Liz J will order the confirmation cake.
- Stewardship: Sarah read the guidelines of the council for this month. It includes stewardship plans for the fall. The council put this in the hands of the Finance Team – whose next meeting is April 8th.

◆ Graduation: We have two graduates this year. One is Karen Yates' granddaughter, Chloe, and the other is Anthony Dye, our new member of Whispering Winds. We will look into Lexington graduation dates and plan for honoring them.

◆ Property | Trustees | Roger: Regarding lawnmowing, we are going to use the same person who mowed last year. Roger removed the flags from the flagpole prior to the last big storm and has had to replace the rope on the pole which included renting a scissor lift. Thomas called Evergy about their smart thermostat program – however – the promotion has ended and the cost would not be viable. Phillip suggested that we replace the two thermostats in the Buddy Black Family Life Center with the Smart Thermostats so they can be controlled from an app on the phones. Liz J most often has to regulate those for assorted building rentals. Roger said he will look into that. Additionally, trustees will get all the thermostats on a twice a year battery changing schedule to avoid batteries going bad.

Hope is being able to see that there is light despite all of the darkness. —Archbishop Desmond Tutu

A re you familiar with your state flag? A number of state flags lack words. Arizona, Alabama, Alaska, Hawaii, Tennessee, Maryland, New Mexico, South Carolina and Texas have no text whatsoever (The C and the O on the state flags of Colorado and Ohio, respectively, count as text.)

Some states have words, but the words simply identify the state: Kansas, Idaho, Wisconsin, Oregon, North Dakota and others.

But most do indeed have words. Take Connecticut, for example. Its flag features the Latin phrase, *Qui transtulit sustinet,* which means, "He who transplanted still sustains" — referring to the early settlers who believed that God guided them to the new land and would continue to sustain them.

Georgia's flag cites the motto not only of the state but of our federal union, "In God We Trust." Vermont's flag bears the words, "Freedom and Unity."

My favorite, however, is the state flag of Rhode Island, which proclaims the word "Hope," which is also the state motto. The motto has been a part of Rhode Island's identity since its early colonial days, symbolizing the hope of religious freedom and new opportunities that led to the state's founding.

Can you imagine what it's like to live without hope?

Hope is often described as the anchor of the soul, providing stability and direction even in the midst of life's storms. It is the belief in the possibility of a better future, a brighter tomorrow, and the potential for change. But what happens when this essential human quality is absent?

It is possible that some of you dear readers feel there is no hope. You are burdened by despair, trapped in a cycle of pain, with no possibility of escape. Every challenge, no matter how small, can seem insurmountable. Perhaps you also live in fear, think your life has no purpose, that you are living in a world without color.

Fortunately, we serve a God of hope, and this God wants you to experience hope — *abundantly!* "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit" (Romans 15:13). —Timothy Merrill

Prayer: O God, like the psalmist David, I sometimes wonder, "Why are you cast down, O my soul, and why are you in turmoil within me?" Then I remember his response: "Hope in God; for I shall again praise him, my salvation and my God." Thank you for being my salvation! Amen!



Palm Sunday, April 13, 2025

Scripture Reading: Luke 19:28-40

In the end, we will remember not the words of our enemies, but the silence of our friends. —Martin Luther King Jr.

If, perchance, a contemporary rock star — let's say Taylor Swift — were to arrive in midtown New York City for an outdoor concert in Times Square or Washington Square, she'd very possibly arrive in a stretch limo, followed by several other vehicles, as well as her personal entourage and staff. Of course, the stage and equipment has already been set up, sound checks are done, everything is ready. She just needs to show up. And when she does, the crowds are there and are going wild — smartphones in the air. People are clamoring for her attention. E Everyone wants a piece of her. The crush is incredible.

In Jesus' day, Jerusalem was a big city, but if someone important entered the city, it was likely a military man, or governmental figure of the Roman Empire. He'd likely enter on a large war horse, befitting the powerful man that he was.

But the people didn't care.

But on the day we call Palm Sunday, they care. Enormous crowds were on hand to greet Jesus as befitting the ("Rock of Ages") rock ("Morning") star he was. He entered Jerusalem riding on a colt, fulfilling the prophecy from Zechariah 9:9 that the King would come in humility. The mob shouted and hollered: Hosanna! Hosanna! They gave him the red cloak treatment, casting off their outer garments to create a carpet of cloth as the tiny beast clopped by. The crowds sang like a song might swell in a football stadium, waving palm branches like rally towels, "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!" (Luke 19:38).


Yet, as we know, only days later, thanks to some machinations of his political enemies and a lot of fake news, Jesus would be jeered and ridiculed by a crowd demanding his crucifixion. This stark contrast challenges us to examine the sincerity of our own faith. Following Jesus means more than moments of celebration; it requires a life of commitment, even when the path becomes difficult.

Prayer: Lord Jesus, as we remember your entry into Jerusalem, we welcome you into our hearts as our Lord and Savior. Help us to follow your example of humility and servanthood. And may our commitment to you remain steadfast, not just in moments of celebration but in every season of life. Amen.

Easter Sunday, April 20, 2025

Scripture Reading: Luke 24:1-12

Our old history ends with the cross; our new history begins with the resurrection. —Watchman Nee

It's Easter Sunday when we are reminded that the resurrection of Jesus Christ is the very heart of our faith. More than that, Easter triumphantly proclaims that God is always at work, bringing life amid death, hope amid despair.

To that end, let's think of a metaphor. In a peaceful meadow, there was a caterpillar who lived a simple and content life. She was unaware that a great transformation awaited her.

One day, she entered a deep sleep, all while weaving an intricate cocoon around herself. She remained there for many days, hidden away and quiet. The other creatures of the meadow wondered if she had died, and some even grieved their loss.

But after some time, the cocoon began to move, and shortly thereafter, a monarch butterfly emerged. The transformation had not been easy, and the butterfly's gossamer wings were weak and fragile at first. She struggled to fly, and for a time, she remained on the branch to which the now-discarded cocoon was still attached.

Then, slowly, the butterfly's wings grew stronger. With the sun shining down on her and the wind encouraging her, she spread her wings and took to the sky. The other creatures of the meadow marveled at how death had been transformed into life; how the earthly had been transfigured into something beautiful; how what had been old had miraculously become new – dazzlingly new!

There are parallels to what is going on at Easter. *Theologically*, like the butterfly's cocoon, the tomb seemed like a place of death and loss. But in the resurrection of Jesus, what seemed like an end became the ultimate beginning — a new life for all believers. Just as the butterfly was transformed, we, too, are transformed by the power of the resurrection, given new hope and life.

But *experientially*, the message of Easter is that even in the darkest moments, when all seems lost, there is always the promise of renewal and resurrection, just as the butterfly emerges from its cocoon to soar into the sky.

Prayer: Loving God, we thank you for the victory of life over death, hope over despair, and love over fear. Through Jesus, you have given us the promise of eternal life, and the assurance that no darkness is too great for your light to overcome. We thank you for the new beginnings you offer us, for the power of your redeeming grace. May we live in the joy and freedom of your resurrection, sharing your love and hope with a world in need. In Jesus' name I pray. Amen.




